For the simplicity of the phrase "man of his word"; it is noted that this includes both men and women. When a person is spoken about and someone says that he is a "man of his word", what does that mean to you? Those five words carry a tremendous number of adjectives in the meaning of this person's character. My personal opinion is that they are perceived as someone that is trustworthy, honorable, reliable, and has integrity. I would be ecstatic if people described me as A WOMAN OF HER WORD. It is comparable to have a medal of honour for the characteristics of you as a person.

When you shake someone's hand and say to them "I give you my word", what does that imply? It is relaying to them that they are to trust you explicitly, to believe that you will keep your promise and follow through; with not just words, but actions. Words without action to me portrays an empty promise. Why say it, if you are not going to do it. That is where trust enters the realm and if someone is constantly expressing words, but not fulfilling their promise, how is a person to fully trust what they are saying? Things happen or roadblocks appear along the way, but keeping people informed of this would only enhance their word. By procrastinating and either doing it later, or not doing it at all, who is this affecting? To me, it is both parties involved. First, the one that is constantly in a procrastination state of mind

because it ultimately affects how they are perceived. The second individual they are corresponding with eventually will not believe them. Their reliability and trustworthiness are questioned.

When someone says to you directly "trust me, I give you my word to help you in your time of need"; that person is relying on your help and commitment. This enables them to have a feeling of safety and security, that no matter what happens, someone will be there to assist me in whatever I need. It is offering someone a piece of cake on a plate and feeding them peace of mind. It is in our hierarchy of needs to feel safe. They are going to receive that nourishment, to give them strength to survive what they are experiencing. If that piece of cake doesn't even have a recipe or even been cooked in the oven; how is it possible to feed that person. Do you comprehend how that individual feels of their existence and importance to you, if there is nothing but breadcrumbs offered to them. That is what being prepared means; when you have made a promise or extended an olive branch to help someone.

What if a person driving a car would continually state that they are going to fill the tank with gas. If they succeeded in this, they would be able to drive anywhere and even take passengers along the way. If they did not fill the tank with gas, how far do you think they will be able to travel. Also, would anyone want to travel with them, knowing full well that eventually they will run out of gas. They are taking your word when they agree to ride with you, that you are taking every precaution to keep the motor running and able to get to their destination.

The importance spoken in marriage vows are being relayed by both parties that they will honour those words. Their commitment is illustrating their character in morals and values. When their promises are broken, this affects their integrity and ultimately the foundation of their unity.

This needs to be taught to our children, grandchildren, nieces, and nephews to be a person of their word and follow through. This is not just spoken to them but led by example on showing them the way to be honorable and trustworthy of yourself as the teacher. They cannot learn the true meaning from you, if you yourself are not fulfilling this prophecy.

In religion, it is spoken "Word of God, Word of Life, Thanks be to God". This is entrusting to people that the word of God is true. It is emphasizing that the word is a powerful message and shall be believed.

Being a "man of his word" or "woman of her word" is the backbone of society. This cannot be taken lightly or not to comprehend the importance of this in our existence. The saying "think before you speak" and the reality of actions and words needing to be in unison is on the top rung of the ladder. If you wish to reach the top of this ladder, you need to take the steps of honesty, integrity, trustworthiness and genuine intent and **BE A PERSON OF THEIR WORD.**
